Math Anxiety: Early Identification and Intervention

With the passing of the Alabama Numeracy Act, educators are becoming more interested in how to identify and address the needs of lower performing students in math. One primary contributor to math difficulties has been linked to math anxiety which refers to an emotional state characterized by negative feelings, tension, apprehension, and/or fear that interferes with math performance in school and in everyday life endeavors (Dietrich et al., 2015). Researchers estimate that 17% of all math performance) and somatic reactions (e.g., tummy aches, sweaty palms, rapid <u>heart-beat</u>, headaches). Behavioral and cognitive neuroscience results speak to the cognitive aspects of math anxiety and suggest that regulating the feelings of anxiety demands resources in the same brain networks critical to effectively controlling working memory (Ochsner & Gross, 2005). Working memory is a system for the temporary holding and manipulation of information during the performance of a particular cognitive task. There are various types of working memory that each impact
